An attempt to demoralise scientists **Joyce**

The All-India Committee of the Breakthrough Science Society is displeased with the scrapping of over a hundred awards in science and technology by the Union Government. They argued that such a measure stands to demoralise the scientific community and weaken the pursuit of science in India.

The awards were given to faculty and scientists who excelled in scientific research and encouraged young scientists to aspire for a higher degree of excellence. The Centre's decision to do away with the awards came on September 16 when Union Home Secretary Ajay Bhalla chaired a meeting to rationalise the process of selection for the awards, which followed PM Narendra Modi's direction to make the selection procedure for the awards transparent.

Speaking to The Beacon, the general secretary of the All India Committee of Breakthrough Science Society, Soumitro Banerjee, said the scrapping of the awards is a part of the collective decision of undermining the science and technology community. Earlier the funds for the Indian National Academy of Engineering (INAE) were scrapped, and the Kishore Vaigyanik Protsahan Yojana (KVPY) scheme was slashed, instructing the scientific institutions to increase fees. The GST on scientific equipment was hiked from 5% to 18%. The Centre has allocated a meagre in the GDP for science and technology, he said.

"As a result of this curtailment policy, the younger scientist will not have enthusiasm towards science," he said.

Speaking to The Beacon a senior Lawyer Arvind Narain said, "As we see the report that so many are charged with false accusations, even though it's a false accusation, a large majority of them are in jail for 10 years before getting released."

People detained under the UAPA wait years or even decades in jail before their trials may start. By the time they are released, the damage is already done, says the report.

TAS officer Harjot Kaur Bamrah's derogatory remark last week has invited a severe backlash across the nation with activists demanding an unconditional apology and a few pointing out that this would further muffle the meek voices of girls on menstrual health.

The outrage was in reaction to Bamrah's response to the appeal of Riya Kumari, a 20-year-old student from Bihar, who asked the government to provide sanitary napkins in schools at an affordable price. "Tomorrow, available in many villages,

Condemning the statement of Bamrah, Amit Kumar, a member of Seva Bharat, a Patna-based NGO, said that the IAS officer shouldn't have spoken in such a disparaging tone without understanding the context of the question posed by the student. "Even today sanitary pads are not

and even if they are available, they are not available at affordable prices," he said.

Anupriya, a woman activist working under Seva Kendra, said, "The position of an IAS officer is very reputable and asks for certain responsibilities. So, if such derogatory comments are received from them, people will step back from asking questions because they'll know how their genuine questions would be answered".

What we could expect from men if a woman says such things, she questioned. "Being a woman, it is wrong to pass such comments. She own rights," said Kumar.

• o improve the digital payment experience and offer an additional layer of protection in online payments, the RBI has introduced a new system in which the credit and debit card details are replaced with tokens.

The Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) card-on-file (CoF) tokenization regulations came into operation on Saturday, October 1, and seeks to enhance the security and safety of card transactions. From now on, the payment gateways or merchants won't be able to

RBI's new layer of protection store the card information such as the CVV and expiry date of the customers for online

transactions.

Tokenization is the process of replacing actual card information with a one-of-a-kind alternate code called "token". In case of an online transaction, a unique token will be saved on the server in place of the card information. The merchant or transaction platform sends a message to Visa, Mastercard, or a payment gateway, which requests a token for that card number and then sends it to the bank to approve the transaction. Only the authorised card network is able to tokenize the cards. Tokenization of cards can be availed by the customers free of cost. The tokenization facility is available on mobile phones, laptops, desktops, Internet of Things devices and wearable devices. "There is not much fraud happening right now in online transactions because of security reasons such as OTP (one-time password). But if the RBI is making it even simpler with technology, then it's a good decision, said Ambika, Bank manager at the Pragathi Grameena bank.
