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AIDSO bats for student-friendly state budget

BENGALURU: The All India Democratic Students' Organisation (AIDSO) has urged that the Karnataka government allocate 30% of the state budget to edincrease the ucation, number of government medical and engineering colleges, and grant free bus passes to all students.

In a press release issued on Monday, AIDSO said students in the state are facing numerous challenges. The reduction in scholarship amount has become a serious concern for students, including mounting tuition fees, inadequate hostel facilities, and a lack of basic amenities in government schools and colleges.

AIDSO urged the state government to announce pro-student and pro-education schemes in the upcoming budget. "Public-funded education institutions have so far provided quality education to lakhs of poor and meritorious students. Government should allocate more funds and strengthen public institutions as lakhs of students in the state are depending on them," said Ajay Kamath, secretary of AIDSO, in the statement.

Through a feminist lens, John explores what ambitions and freedoms mean for women in a hyper-industrial, wealth-driven, and complex world.

One of the passengers in the movie says, "I don't think Mumbai is a fashionable city. Time and work are everything here. If clothing was not important, people would not even dress up." Colonisation has changed the clothing industry. wore blouses on top of sarees.

Another passenger expressed her astonishment about the female antagonist in the movie Gone Girl. "When committed by women, violence is a larger concern," she remarked. This reveals that, in Before, Bengali women never reality, our rights as citizens are not equal, she says.

Some passengers spoke about marriage not being the ultimate aim. "Pregnancy on top of that is not a cherry on top. We cannot wish men could conceive but women deserve a say about their bodies," a pregnant passenger argued. She says that all the years of getting hold of one's body and letting it go for a baby is not a risk some women want to bear.

Some of the student passengers lamented the fact that their parents had crushed their ambition of pursuing sports because of societal stereotypes, and that it was difficult to pursue them even if one chose to. Women who are on foot often get questioned about their virginity. Tress John concluded the event by saying, "I was very triggered by some women. Non-verbal communication is talked about more in this film. In the train, the vibration was spread with pressure points. Controlling the crowd was a task."
