BENGALURU: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday declared that seeking and obtaining justice is the right of every of the citizen and nation Supreme Court is its medium.

Lauding the efforts of Chief Justice of the Apex Court of India DY Chandrachud, during Diamond Jubilee celebrations, on January 28, PM Modi said the ease of delivering justice has improved in the country. The government is committed to improving the physical infrastructure of the court with the approval of 800 crore rupees for the expansion of its building complex, he said.

"Whether it is freedom of expression, personal freedom or social justice, the Supreme Court has strengthened India's vibrant

strong judicial system is the main foundation of a Viksit Bharat," the PM said.

Appreciating digitisation of the Supreme Court records in the form of Digital Supreme Court Reports (Digi SCR), he recounted that 36,308 cases of the apex court, dating back to 1950 are accessible to the public in digital format. The accessibility to the apex court must be

available even in the farthest corners of the country.

During his address, CJI Chandrachud lauded the transformative impact of technology on legal proceedings. "We now have the facility of filing cases at the click of a button," said the chief justice, referring Court e-filing platform introduced in May 2023.

He emphasised the the

"Supreme Court is soon going to migrate its digital data to a cloud-based infrastructure. We are also on the verge of opening a war room equipped with technology enabling the Supreme Court to monitor real-time judicial data of the entire country."

He also proposed the transformation adjournment culture to a culture of professionalism shortening arguments, reducing delays in court verdicts, and providing an equal field for first-generation especially lawyers, disadvantaged from communities.
