Gearing up for Vemula's memory lingers in public mind 'Prana Pratishta'

yodhya is gearing up to welcome the pilgrims from across the globe. The Ram Mandir construction is in full swing as the 'Prana Pratishta' or the inauguration of the temple is on 22 January. The construction of the temple will continue even after the inauguration.

"The temple is being constructed in three phasesthe ground floor is in the first phase and is ready. The construction of the other phases will continue while the temple will be open for the visitors," said VK Mehra, Chief Project Director of L&T, Ayodhya Temple.

The ground floor of the temple has Makrana marble flooring, and the doors are carved and iconography can be seen on the pillars of the temple. There are five 'mandapam' and 1 'Shekhar' in the temple out of which three are ready for the pilgrims to visit.

Talking to The Beacon, Mehra said that there are special facilities for senior citizens such as the lift, and for differently-abled people, a ramp that runs through the temple is put in place. The facility of the toilets and lodging is also there inside the eight-acre premises of the temple. Apart from the temple, the associate structures of the sewage treatment plant, electricity plant and pilgrim facility centre are also ready.
