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Assembly drives Tax movement flares up with separatist undertones sectoral growth

The tenth assembly of the Sikkim Legislative Assembly marked a pivotal moment with the proposal to establish seven new universities in the state. Led by Kunga Nima Lepcha, the Education Department presented bills aimed at enhancing education in Sikkim which was convened on February 12 for its Seventh Session.

Professor Nima Lepcha from Tadong College welcomed the proposal, stating, "Creating seven new universities in Sikkim will significantly improve the forthcoming education." He believes these institutions will offer better opportunities for students and educators, elevating academic standards across the state.

Alongside educational reforms, discussions in the assembly also addressed infrastructure development. The Transport Department introduced a bill focused on this aspect, underscoring the government's commitment to enhancing public infrastructure.


Furthermore, amendments of bills concerning pensions, medical allowances, civil courts, and town planning were deliberated, reflecting the assembly's broader agenda to address various sectors' needs and concerns. Chief Minister Prem Singh Tamang, who also oversees finance, presented the First Supplementary Demands for grants for the financial year 2023-24, outlining the government's financial priorities and allocations.

The proposal for new universities highlights the government's commitment to expanding educational infrastructure to cater to the growing needs of Sikkim's population.

espite Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu's joint protest underlining the unfair tax devolution that visibly creates a north-south divide, the center remains firm on their budget allocation shares. Karnataka Chief Minister (CM) Siddaramaiah and Deputy CM DK Shivakumar spearheaded the Southern Tax Movement to the central government's doorstep at Jantar Mantar.

On the basis of Interim Budget 2024, Karnataka Congress leaders marched to Delhi to protest the alleged issue of discrimination against southern states on February 7. Former Members of Legislative Assembly and member of Parliament from Tamil Nadu also took the stage amidst Congress'

"Bharat Mata ki Jai" and "Delhi Chalo" slogans. Later, Andhra Pradesh and Telangana also raised their voices in unison.

Providing a perspective on the budget, the bar graph shows the state-wise distribution of net proceeds from the center to the states. For every rupee of tax collected from the state government of Karnataka, the Union Government sends back 15 paise. Tamil Nadu gets back 29 paise, Telangana 43 paise, Andhra Pradesh 49 paise and Kerala receives 57 paise. But on the same scale of measure, northern populated states like Bihar receive Rs 7.06, Uttar Pradesh gets Rs 2.73, Assam Rs 2.63 and Madhya Pradesh Rs 2.42. The Union Government

have accused the state governments of harboring a "separatist" mindset and spreading a "false narrative." Meanwhile, the ministers of the state governments countered with their joint concern of the Union government being "step-motherly" towards the south.

The injustice meted out to the southern states is not a new issue and has historical precedence. Unlike the previous nine commissions that used 1971 census data, the 15th FC of 2017 presented its report in 2021, utilizing the 2011 census data for allocating funds to different states. They have perceived it as a penalty and unequal treatment for their accomplishment in population control measures in the delimitation exercise, which the states argued should have been rewarded for.
