
BENGALURU: The School of Business at St Joseph's University conducted the fifth edition of the International Conference on Business and Sustainability (ICBD) to promote sustainable practices in a business environment, said Dr Christo Selvan V, Dean of the School of Business. Dattatraya Dutta ollowing an ultimatum by the Supreme Court, the Election Commission of India recently released a detailed data report on electoral bonds sourced from the State Bank of India. Introduced in 2017, electoral bonds allowed private organisations and individuals to anonymously donate money to political parties. The electoral bonds scheme was introduced by the government through the

Finance Act of 2017 under the pretext of maintaining transparency, as the government claimed it would formalise the influx of money into political parties by channeling it through bank sources. The electoral bonds scheme, however, has been under constant scrutiny since its introduction, as several experts have claimed that it could give an unfair advantage to certain

The detailed report released by the Election Commission reveals a total of 12769 crores worth of electoral bonds being purchased by various private organisations and high-net-worth individuals. The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) emerged as the biggest beneficiary amongst all the political parties, redeeming 6060.5 crores, accounting for 47.5 percent of the total bonds encashed, followed by the All India Trinamool Congress (AITC) and the Indian National Congress (INC), encashing 1609.5 crores and 1421.9 crores, respectively. Dattatraya Dutta the Biju Janata Dal (BJD), and the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) were other major recipients, redeeming 1322 crore, 944.5 crore, and 656.5 crore, respectively.

One major concern after the release of election bond data is the lack of disclosure regarding bond serial numbers, which could help match the

donors with the recipients as there is a lot of ongoing debate around the identity of the donors. A look into the data of the donors reveals that the biggest purchaser of these bonds was a company called Future Gaming and Hotel Services Private Limited, with a purchase worth 1,368 crores. The company has been under the radar of an investigation of financial fraud and money laundering by the Enforcement Directorate.

Another company, Vedanta Private Limited, which purchased bonds worth Rs 400 crore, also has a controversial past. According to an Organized Crime and Corruption Reporting Project (OCCRP) report, this energy and mining giant was involved in a major covert campaign to weaken key environmental regulations in the country.

n Saturday, March 16, the Chief Election Commissioner, Rajiv Kumar emphasised the commission's commitment to enhance inclusivity in the electoral process, particularly by ensuring better representation for youth, women, and Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) for the 2024 General Elections.

The CEC along with Election Commissioners Gyanesh Kumar and Dr Sandhu, unveiled the schedule for the General Elections 2024 to Lok Sabha and State Assemblies. They also announced stringent measures by the Election Commission of India (ECI) to

The Lok Sabha elections 2024, might boast recordbreaking participation, with over 97 crore voters, 1.5 crore polling officials, and 10.5 lakh polling stations. To ensure that the 19.7

Cr young voters (20-29 years) and 1.8 Cr first-time voters exercise their right to vote, the ECI will be collaborating with influencers and opinion leaders like Sachin Tendulkar and Rajkumar Rao among others to create awareness amongst the youth of the nation.

He also stated that the ECI is facing challenges of the four M's: Muscle, Money, Model Code of Conduct violation, and Misinformation. To ensure fair elections it will be taking stringent measures involving tracking any suspicious movements of bribe money, deployment of police personnel and electoral observers to ensure a level playing field.

SJU gears up to tackle water crisis Print is still thriving: John

BENGALURU: The looming water crisis in Silicon City due to depleted groundwater levels and drying of borewells has not left any institutions or locality unaffected. St Joseph's University is also reeling under the severe water crisis this summer.

The water requirement for the university's students is higher compared to other educational institutions, said Dr Melwin Colaco, Registrar of St Joseph's University.

The total student strength of the university from all three shifts is 10,000. Besides students are involved in multiple activities that require them to stay on campus post-lecture hours.

Such a water crisis has become ubiquitous in Bengaluru which prompted DK Shivakumar the Deputy Chief Minister of the state to say that about 7,000 borewells have dried and we have made alternative arrangements for them. "We have identified the water sources. We will see that water is supplied," he said earlier.

"The water that is supplied by the Bangalore Water Supply and Sewerage Board is not sufficient to cater to the needs of our students. We have our STP that is installed on our campus, but it is catering to only a few of the blocks of the university. And therefore, some of the blocks in the university do not have sufficient water as of now," mentioned Dr Colaco.

Currently, the university is managing with limited water availability and is hoping the crisis will not last long. If the government orders the closure of institutions to mitigate the crisis, we are prepared for online classes, he added.

BENGALURU:Legacy media plays a fundamental role in news dissemination and provides many opportunities to young journalists, opined John Thomas a veteran journalist speaking the journalism students. The School of Communication of St Joseph's University hosted a guest lecture on March 14 titled 'Navigating through Legacy Media'. Describing the competition between the legacy media and social media, he said that the

print medium will be at the helm and referred to examples of Bengaluru's prominent newspapers such as Deccan Herald, Times of India, and The Hindu. He pointed to the job stability and opportunities legacy media offers while allowing young journalists to work on their branding and skill development. "Do not focus on the money, instead, build contacts, speak to people, and practice writing job applications," he said.
