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Students bear the brunt of hasty adoption of NEP

Bengaluru: Students and teachers across Karnataka are in limbo as many universities might have to cope with two batches of firstyear degree students from this June.

The first-semester exam for undergraduate students in some universities has been completed while a few others are yet to be held. The second semester scheduled to begin in May will most likely end only in the month of October. This is at a time when the second year PU students are almost done with the exams and would enter the degree education by the end of the next month while the classes for the students of the second semester would have just commenced. The PU and degree colleges, and academicians

in the state are staring at a crisis where they have to run two batches for the first-vear degree. Abhava Diwakar, District President of the All-India Democratic Student Organisation, said, "This issue as well as many others has come from the implementation of the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP) in Karnataka. Last year, the BJP-led government had pushed NEP to appease the Centre, despite the warning and opposition from many educationists." She explained that the setback in the academic calendar is due to a lack of planning. In many districts, the textbooks proposed by the NEP committee were unavailable for over two to three months. Students attended class in vain as lectures were put on hold

due to the lack of study material. This led to a delay in the release of the semester examination timetable as teachers struggled to complete the syllabus, she said. "There are universities that still haven't even announced exams. This has left students

shouldering a mountain of stress and uncertainty as to when they will be moving forward to the next semester. Additionally, teachers cannot teach two batches at a time, along with the second and third-year students," she added.
