POCSO Act: Supreme Court overturns the 'Skin-To-Skin' judgement of the Bombay HC

BENGALURU: The Supreme Court on Thursday reversed the verdict of the Bombay High Court which had held that no offence of sexual assault under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act can be established if there is no direct skin-to-skin contact between an accused and victim. Pointing out to a loophole in the verdict, KK Venugopal, Attorney General of India had said, "Someone can wear a surgical glove and exploit a child and get away scot-free," The Beacon spoke to Sangita Kalra, a practicing lawyer in Delhi who said, "The reasoning of the High Court insensitively trivialized and normalized behaviour which undermines the dignity of children. The High

Court erred in coming to such a conclusion. Skin-to-skin touching was not required as the word 'naked' was missing from Section 7 of the POCSO. When two interpretations are possible, the one which is favourable to children must be

taken."

The verdict allowed the offenders to escape the law according to the legal experts. Drishti Kharbanda, founder of Sarvani, a Women Rights NGO said, "Bombay HC judgment was absurd from the begin-

Canva ning as the intent of the ACT to protect children against sexual offenses would be defeated. More importantly, we need to focus on intent when these crimes are committed and not narrow definitions of physical contact or touch."

Anjali Chauhan said, "SC rejected absurdity while standing by sensitivity. We never leave any opportunity to brag about the huge young population we have in our country but systematically ignore the trauma these young kids hold while stepping into adulthood. Touch or no touch, harassment is harassment and we have to face it, fight it."

Welcoming the verdict, writer

An advocate of the Supreme Court, Digant Mishra said, "When a decision is being made especially on matters relating to the sensitivity of a situation faced by a child or any individual it shall be dealt with equal importance as that of any other. The court should be transparent and appropriate remarks has to be made on either quashing of the verdict or accepting it."

Is Apple selfservice a huge win for its users?

BENGALURU: Apple has announced a "self-service repair" service that allows "comfortable users" to repair their own devices. It will cover replacing the batteries, screens, and cameras of newer iPhones when it launches in early 2022 in the United States.

On Wednesday Apple chief operating officer Jeff Williams said, "Creating greater access to Apple genuine parts gives our customers more choices if repair is needed,"

While this is a considered as a great win for Apple users and they applaud the creators of the program, there areconcerns about how Apple is framing Self Service Repair and its potential consequences. The customers say the Apple doesn't want people to believe they can fix their own iPhone.

"(It) May be a mixed blessing since their equipment is notably difficult to repair, owing to the fact that specific tools are frequently required, parts may be glued together, and components such as Apple's Touch-ID sensor and T2 security chip may make reassembling devices difficult," said Maheep, an apple user. "iPhone 12 and 13 series are made in such a way that they are the most durable iPhones in the market. However, SE being one of the top-selling iPhones and comparatively less durable among the iPhones sold at the moment is not added to the list of phones which has the Self-service program," said Karan.
