India's largest IPO fails at the stock market

BENGALURU: The Paytm IPO that has been under the spotlight for months failed to live up to the hype on its listing day. The company staged India's largest-ever IPO of Rs 18,300 crore but flopped in its

One 97 Communications, the parent company of Paytm made a poor stock market debut as its shares plummeted to Rs 1,950, a 9 percent discount against its issue price of Rs 2,150 at the National Stock Exchange (NSE) on Thursday. At the Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE), the stock opened at Rs 1,955 per share, incurring a loss of 23.25 per-

Arjun Bhattacharya, Assistant Professor of Economics at Dinabandhu Andrews Institute of Technology & Management, Calcutta said, "There are multiple reasons why an IPO fails and some of the reasons why Paytm failed is the launch of many other e-banking applications in the last two years."

He added, "However, I believe this is not permanent and hope Paytm does well in the market over time."

Sanampreet Singh, a Commercial Litigation Lawyer, said, "I think they should have issued a smaller portfolio in the market. Considering the company is currently undergoing a financial loss, they should have waited until the losses made were mitigated to a good extent."

700 lives.. year long struggle.. farmers win!

BENGALURU: The standoff that the nation has witnessed for a full year between the farmers and the Modi Government on the controversial farm laws has finally been resolved with the Prime Minister announcing today that the laws will be repealed in the next Parliament ses-

What was considered to be a prestige issue for the Modi government has now been foregone as the tenacity of the farmers to fight beyond what the administration expected has dented the image of the

"We have decided to repeal three farm laws. We will finish the constitutional process to repeal the law in the upcoming Parliament session", Modi said while requesting the farmers to end the protest

and go back home.

In response, Bharatiya Kisan Union (BKU) leader Rakesh Tikait, stated, "We shall take a decision on the withdrawal of protests only after the laws are scrapped after due Parliamentary procedures. The other issues of the farmers also need to be discussed."

The protests began on November 25th, following the promulgation of the laws in September 2020. Thousands of farmers, mostly from Haryana and Punjab gathered together and marched towards the capital. The government

had guaranteed to enact amendments, but they were not accepted by the farmers. BKU then filed a petition in the Supreme Court challenging the three farm laws on December 11, 2020. On Republic Day 2021, hundreds of

farmers carried out a tractor

rally protest towards the capital. Some of them digressed and hoisted the Sikh holy flag, symbolising spiritual and political sovereignty, next to India's national flag at the Red Fort. This led to a situation of chaos wherein several police personnel and farmers were injured. A protester was killed when a tractor overturned under the impact of tear gas. And this added fuel to the fire.

No official record of farmers' deaths has been registered by the government. The situation got tense after the Lakhimpur Kheri case, in which Ashish Mishra, the son of Union Minister of State for Home and BJP MP Ajay Kumar Mishra, ran his car over peaceful farmer protesters killing four farmers and a journalist.

: Michelle Bachelet condemns killings of protesters in Sudan

Michelle Bachelet, the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, on Thursday, condemned the killing of 39 persons in Sudan by security forces since the military coup on October 25. The death toll increased on Thursday following a shootout during a protest in Khartoum, Khartoum-Bahri, and Omdurman.

Bachelet said, "Following our repeated appeals to the military and security authorities to refrain from the use of unnecessary and disproportionate force against demonstrators, it is utterly shameful that live ammunition was again used yesterday against protesters." He further added, "Shooting into large crowds of unarmed demonstrators, leaving dozens dead and many more injured, is deplorable, clearly aimed at stifling the expression of public dissent, and amounts to gross violations of international human rights law." More than 100 persons were injured during the protests, according to reliable medical sources, with 80 of them suffering gunshot wounds to their upper bodies and heads.

Lunar Eclipse 2021 is expected Epain for Paine: Captaincy woes for Australia to be the longest in 581 years

The longest partial lunar eclipse of the 21st century with a span of three hours and twenty-eight minutes will be visible on Friday, November 19. This will give the moon rusty crimson hues and be visible from North America, South America, Asia, and Australia.

"We expect that it will begin at 12:48 p.m. and end at 4:17 p.m. IST. The eclipse will reach its pinnacle around 2:34 p.m. IST, and the Earth's shadow will cover 97 percent of the moon," said Manash

Bagchi, Director of Regional Science Centre & Planetarium, Calicut.

"Once it travels into Earth's shadow, it will look to the naked eye as if a bite has been taken out of the moon. The rusty-red tint will appear approximately 2:15 p.m. IST, lasting around 30 minutes before gradually diminishing after the eclipse peak," tweeted NASA.

A lunar eclipse, unlike solar eclipses, does not need the use of protective glasses and: can be observed with the naked eye.
