15th Civil Services Day: A celebration of responsibility, accountability and impartiality

The Department of Personnel and Training is commemorating National Civil Services Day with a two-day celebration in New Delhi on the 20th and 21st of April. The event will be inaugurated by the Union Minister of State, Dr. Jitendra Singh.

The Prime Minister's Awards for Excellence in Public Administration 2021 will be presented to district units to implement Priority Programmes and innovation in different categories. Every year approximately 10 lakh students apply for the civil services exam in India. It is considered one of the most prestigious and highest-paying jobs in the country.

Ankit Chhikara, an IAS aspirant said, "The profession gives authority and you have that level of constitutional power to empower people. Even after you have retired, you still have multiple options to serve your country." The Prime Minister will also be releasing e-books on Priority Programmes and Innovations consisting of success stories. A film on the Award-winning initiatives will be screened at the ceremony. Four sessions will be organised on subjects related to PM Gati Shakti, Digital Payments, and Good Governance through PM SVANidhi Yojna, One District One Product Scheme, and Aspirational District Program-Saturation.

To finance its social welfare measures, the government invariably expanded its indirect tax net by steeply increasing the duty on crude oil and collected a whopping amount of 8 lakh crore in four years which is un-

munal issues such as hijab, controversy related to Azan, and Halal meat.

The government seems to be in no mood to relieve the consumers by cutting down the fuel price which is having a cascading effect on all the commodity prices. Prices of food products, edible oils, toiletries, electricity, and other necessities including public transport have sky-rocketed.

Tech enthusiast Ritick opined, "Meta is trying to make the whole messaging experience synchronous across their different products, making the brand identity stronger." Some of these features were already available to beta testers on Android and iOS platforms.
