## B'luru records highest cuber Three-member team to probe Pegasus: SC highest cyber crime cases thrice in a row

time in a row records the highest number of cybercrime cases. The National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) reported that out of 18657 cybercrime cases registered in 2020, nearly half of them, that is, 8892 were committed in Bengaluru for the third time in a row, recording the highest number of cybercrime cases.

Bengaluru City Police Commissioner, Kamal Pant introduced 'A Pilot Project' to control the rapidly rising cybercrimes in Bengaluru. "To begin with, we've set up a multi-disciplinary team that involves the Cybercrime Information Report (CIR) to help victims file a complaint Shada Amina from anywhere with just a call to the special number," Pant had said earlier.

"The dedicated cops have to attend to the calls within 30 seconds and forward it to the police station under whose limits the alleged crime took place," he had said.

According to the NCRB report, Hyderabad, with 2553 cases stands second after Bengaluru in the Cybercrime cases as of 2020 and has almost doubled in the number of cases in comparison to 2019.

The Chief Justice of India, N V Ramana, on 23 September mentioned that a technical committee will be formed to probe into the allegations of snooping by the Pegasus spyware.

The issue was first raised on 18 July when a consortium of 17 journalistic organizations released a long investigative report on the use of Pegasus spyware on multiple individuals.

Raja Shekhar, the Vice President of AISEC Karnataka said, "Our objection to this policy is that the government is going to centralize the whole education. Shekhar noted that NEP 2020 fails to address the government-run educational institutions. He said, "70% of teaching positions in government institutions are vacant, and there is also a lack of infrastructure. These two can be controlled only when there is sufficient fund allocation."

To combat the ill-effects of NEP, the AISEC drafted the People's Alternative Education Policy. "After this conference, we'll meet state governments and make them reject the NEP and introduce the alternative policy."
